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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The other day a new 'motivational type' poster was put up at the place where I work. It simply said, "Assuming can get us into big trouble. Get the facts first." What we do as genealogists is to gather the facts on our families. We need to separate out the facts from the assumptions, the guesses, the myths, and the misspelled names.

In a courthouse record of a distant relative of mine in South Dakota there was a case of a misspelling. This simple written information had fifteen lines and of those I found 13 different spellings on this one document. Now if I did not know the family and looked at the record today it would be lots of wondering as to what the correct spelling should have been. As I knew the family I could find the correct spelling but how many times can a courthouse person write something down on one piece of document and have so many spelling changes.

When my grandfather arrived in the United States from Denmark he changed the name from Andersen to Anderson. Then when some of his siblings arrived some of them also changed it to Anderson. However, one of his brothers kept the spelling as Andersen. Another one who had changed it from Andersen to Anderson changed it back again to Andersen before he died. So a person needs to know changes can be made by a person or a change may be a misspelling by someone. If you know that something like this happened in your family make sure you write that information down so the ones who look for that information in the future will know what took place in our lives.

Earlier this year another event took place that made me think along some new lines. A friend's mother passed away and in her obit it stated her name. Now that is not unusual for we hope to find the person's name on an obit.

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The March meeting will be held on the third Saturday March 21 at 2:00 P.M. in the Norfolk Public Library meeting room. It will include a tour of the genealogical materials available at the Public Library.

The April meeting will be held on April 18 at the Norfolk Public Library meeting room. The program will be a video, part of the Ancestors Series that was on television, called "Records at Risk". It is a very interesting introduction to genealogy and the Ancestors Series.

It was listed with her first name, middle name and then 3 surnames. The last one was the name I knew her by for many years. The surname after her middle name was her maiden name. In visiting with a family member of this lady I mentioned I did not know she had been married before. She had taken that name as well and the first time I saw it in the newspaper.

However, we know that is not going to be the case. So be diligent in your efforts and do not give up in your searching for information.

Headline Articles From The Past

The Norfolk Daily News Tuesday, August 29, 1899 on page 3.

"The infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Koerber, who live in Nenow's addition, died Sunday evening and the funeral was held from Christ's Lutheran church this afternoon, Rev. J. P. Mueller officiating. The little one was buried in the cemetery east of the city."

The Norfolk Daily News Monday, September 4, 1899 on page 3.

"Wm. Zachert, whose home is near Laurel but was formerly a resident of Norfolk, died at the home of his brother-in-law, L. C. Mittelstadt, Saturday night, of abscess of the liver. He was 47 years of age and leaves a wife and five children, besides numerous other relatives and friends, to mourn his loss. The funeral was held this afternoon at 2 o'clock from Christ's Lutheran church, Rev. J. P. Mueller officiating and the remains will be interred in the cemetery east of the city. The deceased came to Norfolk some days ago, with the intention of going to Omaha and having an operation performed. The doctors here, however, advised him not to do so and he remained at the home of Mr. Mittlestadt awaiting the end. A number of out-of-town relatives and friends are here attending the obsequies."

Funeral Services Held for William H. Pratt

Funeral services for William H. Pratt, who died at Norfolk on Wednesday of last week, were held at the Methodist church in Battle Creek at 2:30 Sunday afternoon with Pastor W. C. George in charge.

Mr. Pratt was born at Kankakee, Illinois, April 12, 1868, the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Pratt. His age at death was 81 years 10 months and 10 days.

In 1872, the family came to Madison county, Nebraska, and occupied a homestead south of Battle Creek. Mr. Pratt was married to Blanche Palmer April 8, 1891, and they lived on a farm near Battle Creek until 1908, when they moved to the John Crook farm near Meadow Grove. They moved to Lincoln in 1910 and after the death of Mrs. Pratt in 1944, Mr. Pratt lived at Meadow Grove and Battle Creek. About a year (ago) he became a resident of Norfolk, where he has purchased a home.

He was preceded in death by his wife, a sister, Mrs. Bertha Berg, and a brother, Arthur. Survivors are two sons, Harlan and Irven; two daughters, Mrs. Edith Stauffer and Mrs. Bertha Coleman; four brothers, George, Clarence, Jess, and Jacob; two sisters, Mrs. Emma Heath and Mrs. Lizzie Malloy. Tuesday's Blizzard Does Little Damage Here

The raging snowstorm and terrific winds of Tuesday afternoon and night which played havoc in many localities over the state, found the Battle Creek area only slightly vulnerable to attack

Some of the smaller farm buildings were partially wrecked, but no serious damage to

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farm and town residences has been reported.

Traffic was at a standstill until Thursday, when most highways were partially opened and essential traffic was resumed.

With many lines down, users of electricity were inconvenienced for a time, but service was resumed in a remarkably short time considering obstacles which had to be met by linemen and electricians.

Old-timers say they had never known a wind to equal in velocity that of Tuesday night. Weather bureaus recorded gusts reaching as much as 90 miles an hour, with an average between 55 and 60 during the night.

There are fifteen grandchildren and five great-grandchildren, which include twin granddaughters and two sets of twin great-grandchildren. Married in Virginia in 1884, Mr. and Mrs. Flanagan were the parents of twelve children, four of whom died in infancy. Mrs. Flanagan passed away in 1945.

Richard Reeves Passes

Richard L. Reeves, former resident of the Emerick community, died Friday at a Norfolk hospital after a lingering illness. Funeral services conducted by Rev. Hawes of the First Methodist church were held Tuesday and burial was in the Emerick cemetery. He is survived by his wife, Ellen.

In the early days, the Reeves family operated a typical country store at Emerick, thence one of the county's postoffices.

Funeral services for George Craig, 79, at one time a resident of Battle Creek, were held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Methodist Church in Battle Creek with Pastor W. C. George of Meadow Grove officiating. Burial was in Union cemetery.

Mr. Craig died Sunday in Council Bluffs, Iowa, where he had recently been under treatment. He had been a resident of Inman for many years, making his home with a sister.

Surviving are five sisters, among them Mrs. J. W. Demerritt of Battle Creek. Others are Mrs. Ollie Werner, Omaha, Mrs. John Gallagher, Inman, Mrs. Rhoka Decker, Norfolk, and Mrs. Ellice Halley, Seattle, Washington.

Foglesong Funeral Held on Tuesday

The funeral of Sidney P. Foglesong was conducted by Rev. John E. Stayton at the Resseguie Funeral home Tuesday afternoon, April 18. Burial was at Crown Hill cemetery.

Mr. Foglesong died at his home of a long-standing heart ailment on April 15, aged 78 years and 7 months. He was born September 13, 1871, in Pottawattamie county, Iowa, the son of Simon and Lamiar Foglesong. His parents had been born in Indiana but moved west, coming on to Plattsmouth after Sidney was born.

In his twenty-first year, the family moved to a farm near St. Edward and later to a homestead in Wyoming. After six years there, Sidney came to Madison with his younger sister Hazel and remained here the past twenty-two years.

The father and mother, two brothers and a sister preceded Sidney Foglesong in death. He is survived by the younger sister with whom he made his home and another sister, Mrs. Ida Niedt, of Murray, Iowa. Also four nieces, Mrs. Lucy Harsh of Platte Center, Mrs. Evard Dress of Sidney, Mrs. Helen Stephenson and Mrs. Charles Nutt in Iowa; and one nephew, Edwin Foglesong of Malad City, Idaho.

Pallbearers were Ernest Ellis, George White, Harvey Jackson, E. E. Pugh, Irven Wyatt and Ray Hixson.

Katie Kopach was born in Washington county, Iowa, April 28, 1867, and died at Newman Grove, Nebr., on February 25, 1950, at the age of 82 years, 9 months and 27 days.

In 1885 she was married to Joseph Chada in Keyapaha county. Three children were born to this union, all of whom with her husband, preceded her in death.

She was married to Reuben A. Adams of Battle Creek on Sept. 20, 1898. Four children

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were born to this union. One, Jimmie, preceded her in death on April 2, 1905. Mr. Adams died in 1935.

Survivors were two sons, Jesse of Meadow Grove and Harvey of Redondo Beach, Calif., and a daughter, Mrs. Hazel Boyer, also of Redondo Beach; a stepson, Frank Adams of Meadow Grove; 18 grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren, together with other relatives and a host of friends.

Bad Census Takers: How to Check "Unusual Names" in census Records by Cleveland Evans, Bellevue University, 2009

Mr. Evans' program was quite interesting. Using the book BAD BABY NAMES by Michael Sherrod and Matthew Rayback as his starting point he proceeded to research and show us how to research names in the US Census.

1. Hades Fryher?

A girl named "Hades Fryher" in the 1920 census of Long Island is featured on the cover of BAD BABY NAMES. The authors say the father Louis Fryher, a cook at a torpedo station, "may have believed in tough love"

Checking the 1930 census for the same Long Island town, we find the family's last name speller Frayher and the same daughter clearly listed as Gladys. Going back to 1920 and comparing other entries, we see the problem is the odd way the census taker made capital G's.

Census takers were not chosen for penmanship or ability to spell, often they took information from neighbors, they had to deal with interpreting information from accents they weren't familiar with and they often accepted what people told them on face value.

Records mislead in several ways: Bad handwriting can be misinterpreted as with "Hades Fryher". Census takers can misspell names, Census takers can mishear names, nicknames can be listed as given names and people giving information to the census taker can lie or joke about names.

2. Sexy Chambers

"When you name your daughter Sexy Chambers, what are you thinking?" say Sherrod and Rayback

Comparison of 1910 and 1920 census records for the Chambers family shows what they were thinking was "Texie"

There are over 3800 examples of Texie or Texy in Ancestry.com vs 43 Sexie or Sexy Texy is a very common name especially for girls in Texas.

3. Pete & Pumps

Pumps Duke in 1930 Georgia census has twin names Peter, the same family in 1920 has the twins listed as Hughie and Dewy

Another nickname example: Limbo Hollowway turns out to be Lemuel in other censuses.

4. Are Ghouls born or made?

A man listed as Ghoul Nipple in both the 1920 and 1930 censuses but as a child in 1900 and 1910 censuses both have him as Gould Nipple.

- 5. Another "hellish" name listed is Purgatory Stow. She is cleared listed as Purgatory in 1870 Louisiana as a four year old. In 1880, the same girl is listed as Ann Stowe. Was she Purgatory Ann? or just misbehaving?
- 6. Another one featured is Mars Nix of Franklin Co. Alabama born in 1828. Since only one census is available, I found a phone number for Lance Nix, older brother, in same town. Widow and daughter of Lance Nix said his brother was Mars Nix, "but it wasn't spelled that way" —Mars and Morris sound the same in Franklin County

Several other examples were given and discussed including rankings of popular names, finding the use of obscure but not unique names like Texie, and getting clues to the origin of names such as Semanthe.

ECKERT/GABRIEL/RAUTENBERG

Floyd Brown from Lyons, NE is seeking identification of photographs. The photos came from a picture album of William Rautenberg. The album was handed on to a nephew Elmer Rautenberg, and Elmer's wife, Mae, gave the album to her daughter (Judy Brown) in 1983. Mae could not identify any of the members and a Wilma (Rautenberg) Brown of Tilden could not identify any of the photos. I have shown them to many people in the Tilden area and no one can identify them.

The photo entitled Willie's book 19 has the name Chas. Routenberg on it. However there were two Chas. Routenbergs, the father and the son. The son was sickly the latter part of his life and the last few years he spent in Norfolk at the Verges Sanitarium. 
