My Nebraska: Memories of the Elkhorn Valley

The Elkhorn Valley Museum has received a grant from the Norfolk Community Foundation Fund to do an oral history project. NORFOLK BUSINESS COLLEGE—A BIT OF HISTORY


Researchers have been busy this month with queries, and one in particular I found interesting was a question about the Norfolk Business College, and one of its former teachers in 1939. After some digging I found old newspaper clippings that Brown's Business College of Sioux City, Iowa, opened a branch business college here on September 1, 1901. It was located on the 3rd floor of the original 'Cotton Block', a 3-story building on the southeast corner of Norfolk Avenue and Fourth Street. Mr. O. H. Cook was the president and it was the only privately operated business school in northeast Nebraska, offering young people of this area the opportunity of getting complete commercial training in stenography, secretarial, accounting and even civil service. Its success over the years had established for it an enviable reputation for accuracy and speed by winning first place in 1927-28 among private business colleges in the state. Thousands have received their business training, and through the civil service provided, many students received appointments to federal positions.

In 1939 Mrs. Neva Townsend was in charge and taught in the college, while Mr. Cook took a 6-week leave for medical reasons. The college continued on through the years and in 1950 was operated by Milton C. Rockwell. His wife, Mrs. Letha B. Rockwell was an excellent instructor in stenography and secretarial skills. However, within a few years they moved to Denver, and the college closed its doors.

In those earlier years the business college was on the third floor, along with a public hall; the local telephone office occupied the second floor; and the first floor was a fine departmentclothing store, well known originally as Killians, then in the memory of many of our current readers, it was Hutchinson's (I can still remember the elegant women's hats-it was the place to go for stylish hats). Hutchinson's closed its doors as Norfolk downtown business development continued along the entire south side of that block, and that historic corner was replaced by the current U. S. Bank, 333 Norfolk Avenue.

O. H. Cooks on Trip—Mr. and Mrs. O. H. Cook expected to leave Tuesday for Los Angeles to spend about six weeks with their daugh-ter. Jacqueline. They decided to make the journey after a doctor had advised Mr. Cook, president of the Norfolk College of Busi-ness, to take a six-week rest on account of failing health. During his absence, Mrs. Neva Townsend, Ponca, will have charge of the business college. She received her degree from the University of Nebraska and has ten years' teaching experience to her credit. She has taught in a number of high schools in Nebraska and Michigan, and the National Busi-ness Training school of Sioux City, "I feel most fortunate in finding one of her ability and I feel confident she will continue the policies that we have al-ways maintained," Mr. Cook said. BRANCH BUSINESS COLLEGE IS PLANNED G. W. Brown, Jr. proprietor of Brown's **Business College of** Sioux City, Iowa expects to open a branch business college here the 1st of September, although workers will be here July 1. WHO AM I? Our Society member, Jeanette Koehn, recently sent us a photo of the earlier Fifth Street Tavern, with a question: who are the men shown in the photo? We have enlarged and cropped that photo and if anyone recognizes either of those faces please contact us.

A bit of history which may be helpful: A "Fifth Street Tavern" has been on the northwest corner of Fifth Street and Norfolk Avenue for many years. The street address is 500 Norfolk Avenue. A huge fire in 1948 destroyed that entire block, including the lumber yard, café and the 5th Street Tavern, and possibly another structure. New brick construction of all buildings followed, and the Fifth Street Tavern again located on that corner. It is popular and occasionally has live music entertainment.

The question is –who is the man in the white shirt in forefront of the photo? Does anyone recognize him, or the other man? We would like to know what you remember of those early years of the Fifth Street Tavern, and any employees who may have worked there. It appears that this photo may have been taken in the 1940s, before the big fire of 1948.

We have returned the original photo to Jeanette, with our thanks for sharing it with us. And we have a copy in our file. Jan.— Feb. 2015

HOMESTEAD RECORDS BEING DIGITZED.

Mark Engler, Superintendent of the Homestead National Monument, had the original idea of making homestead records at the National Archives in Washington, D. C. more available to genealogists, historians, scholars and the public. Five years later his dream has come true, and Nebraska is first in the nation to digitize their Homestead Records of the 30 states with homestead land, as Nebraska has the largest percentage of land under the Homestead Act of 1862. Illinois and Indiana homestead records have been digitized and will soon be on line along with Nebraska.
