Preserving Old Newspaper Clippings. Are those old newspaper clippings that you've been keeping for so many years turning yellow and threatening to crumble? Experts at the National Archives, who have the same problem, suggest the following method of preserving them. Mix two teaspoons of magnesium carbonate and one quart of club soda in a large plastic dish. Sandwich the clippings between two pieces of screef or Pellon; a material sold in most fabric stores, and soak for 30 minutes. Mop 46 the excess water with blotting paper and allow to dry overnightion more blotting taper. After using this preservation technique, store the clippings in a weil=Bealed flat plastic bag. They should keep forever.(Family Circle, Jun.24,1980) (these Newsletter = Nov, 1983)

Continuation of the 10th anniversary of the Madison County Genealogical Society, compiled from information submitted by Marge Fuhrman. (July 1983)

The Madison County Genealogical Society initiated many activities in 1978. Participation in the Charity Bazaar to promote interest in the society and purchase of a metal cabinet for books and supplies of the society were some of these activities. The highlight of the year was sponsoring an Everton workshop in Battle Creek. Myrtle Eddy was honored with a Certificate of Appreciation from the Nebraska Genealogical Society for her contributions to the local society and to the preservation of Nebraska history.

Plans to help save the old pioneer cemetery in Madison were formulated in 1979 with many concerned members involved. Also our society made plans to publish a quarterly newsletter. Meeting place of the society was changed to the Educational Unit of the First Baptist Church. Joyce Borgelt received the Nebraska State Genealogical Society Certificate of Appreciation at the state meeting in Kearney.

In 1980, John E. Carter, Curator of Photographs at the Nebraska State Historical Society spoke to our group on caring for old photographs. Work was begun by our society on reprinting the 1941 History of Winside and by August, 1980, we had sold 125 copies. The same year our society hosted the 3rd annual convention of the Nebraska State Genealogical Society. Efforts of all members of our society contributed to the success of the convention. We also began an index card system for collecting obituaries from area newspapers.

In 1981 Marge Fuhrman was honored with a Certificate of Appreciation from the Nebraska State Genealogical Society for her work in restoring the Barnes Reserve Cemetery in Madison. At one meeting the same year, members enjoyed sampling food made from family recipes. Wayne Hanway, new librarian at the Norfolk Public Library spoke to our group on genealogical resources available at the local library.

In 1982 Eunice Coover received the Certificate of Appreciation from the Nebraska State Genealogical Society for her work with various projects. Our society sponsored an Everton workshop in Norfolk this same year.

Cindy Steinhoff-Drake of the Nebraska State Historical Society brought us much useful information about German research at a meeting of our society in 1983. John and Edna Bentz of California, and charter members of the German Research Association, also presented an informative program about doing German research.

In the ten years of its existence, Madison County Genealogical Society has contributed much to those who share the common bond of genealogy interest and research. The society continues to foster preservation of the past by encouraging and helping its members in tracing their roots.

From the mailbox of Bernice TINIUS DEWEY: My New Year is off with a roar -- my Holiday mail full of surprises. I have been researching with Kent County Genealogical Society, Chatham. Ontario, Canada, on my husband's Mother's surname BANNER, giving them names and information on his aunts and uncles who lived on the shore of Lake Erie (Cedar Springs area just east of Detroit, Mich.) in the 1920 & 30's. Well, seems the KCGS correspondence secretary, Joan Griffin, years ago bought some old ledger books at a local flea market thinking they might prove useful in the future. My letter to her (surname MYERS from Norfolk, NE) all of a sudden rang a bell--WHAT A COINCIDENCE! Inside those old books were some letter from the 1930's describing relatives from Norfolk. NE who had traveled all the way to Cedar Springs to visit relatives. Immediately Joan zeroxed the letters and sent them on to me. Instantly I recognized the visiting relatives as my husband's parents on one of their trips to Canada. My husband is not given to sentiment, but it was touching to read about his own father and mother and their activities 50 years ago. That led him to a bit of reminiscing about a special trip to the Chicago World's Fair in 1933-1934 when he was taken along; and then on to Canada to visit all those relatives. He was about 13 years old and the girl writing the letters, Lena, a slightly older cousin, who was quite impressed that they "had come 1000 miles to see some family". They wanted to bring Cousin Lena back to Norfolk for a visit, but she said 1000 was too far away. So they took her father back to Chicago to show him the big city. In a later letter to his brother near Toronto, he described it all in considerable detail as "the best trip I ever had". He mentions every city from Detroit to Chicago -- some excerpts of his impressions: "Ann Arbor. a wonderful place with many hospitals. The city is built in the woods with large trees all around on the streets, just like a big park. Then to Jackson -- the state prison is there and automobile factories .... Battle Creek ... Camp Custard, the soldiers camp and for the disabled ... Kalamazoo noted for its large paper mills and is a beautiful place ... the highway runs beside a mountain and river. Benton Harbor on Lake Michigan ... from there we drove 100 miles along the lake ... hundreds of acres of land all in grapes and cherries there...Gary with 4000.000 pop. but land is no good there-nothing will grow. Then Whiting and from there is solid city to Chicago--forty-five miles with a constant string of cars, seemed to be nothing but cars. We went by the house where Leopold lived, the boy that murdered the little Frank boy. Stopped in the loop at the Van Buran Hotel. The loop is the central part of Chicago, 7 blks, long by 5 wide. There are 35,000 people working in the loop. All the large stores are there, some cover whole blocks. 30 stories high. There are elevated streets and elevated railways..drove for nine miles on an elevated street. Bought a silk dress for Lena..cost \$8.75...if I got it here (Canada) I would have to give \$30.00. It is remarkable the difference in all prices. Automobiles are half the prize they are here. No wonder a nation gets along so well. The taxes are not half of what we pay... I always wanted to see Chicago ... it was the best trip I ever had."

As if that wasn't sufficient HOLIDAY CHEER--my cousine in West Germany sent me a packet containing additional family history and genealogy on my Mother's line ARNOLD, now carrying it back to the 1700's. Can't help but speculate on how the lack of transportation in those days determined their lives--those people lived, married and died in the same village area for about 200 years--covering 6 or 7 generations. We must have been related to just about everyone in that village in one generation or another at some time! If I were there, think I would greet everyone on the street with "Guten Tag, Cousind!" But by mid-1800's some migrated to Dresden, Leipzig and western Germany. They began as peasant-farmers and village elders, and then on into educational and ministerial fields. This interesting copy she sent me has opened up a whole new area which I am eager to check out. Bernice T. Dewey, Jan. 1984


