Historical Background Adds Meaning to Cift

Genealogists who have accumulated a collection of family documents and photographs can find ideas for unusual Christmas gifts just by searching through their files.

The trick is to select something that will be of interest to a particular person and to present it in an innovative way.

One possibility would be to frame a reproduction of a wedding photograph along with a copy of the marriage certificate of the couple pictured.

For a new bride, present a series of photographs of her mother, her mother's mother, and so forth as each one appeared on their wedding day. This idea is particularly effective if there is a strong family resemblance from one generation to the next.

Miniatures

Don't feel that you need to be limited to an ordinary frame. Craft shops carry materials for trays that can be used to seal a collection of newspaper articles and other items about a particular event.

And what would be a better gift for the dollhouse enthusiast than a tiny portrait of her ancestor to hang over her

miniature fireplace, especially if the house is a replica of the ancestral home.

Photographs that have been reduced in size can be used as tree ornaments or to decorate a package.

Tiny frames are available in hobby shops or shops specializing in miniature supplies. Or you might want to create your own from scraps of cardboard or fabric.

If a regular-size picture is more to your taste, consider using photographs of a childhood home to create a pencil or ink drawing. Taped or videotaped interviews of older relatives are also a special way of preserving family memories.

Tied to Book

Young people who are old enough to have some knowledge of historical events might enjoy a gift that ties their family with a special time and place.

One of the Laura Ingalls Wilder books will take on special meaning if presented with a copy of the homestead papers and an inexpensive map showing that the family farm was near where the Ingalls family lived.

A good substitute for the homestead record would be a census listing an ancestor at about the same age as the boy or girl receiving the gift, and in about the same time period as the story takes

Include a note saying something like, "Sally, age 10 on this census record, was your great-great-grandmother. She was the same age as Laura in this book when her family moved to Iowa in 1870."

Good Quality

The kinds of ideas for gifts based on, family mementos are limited only to your imagination. Include an inexpensive copy of an appropriate photograph, if possible, and be sure to document the relationship for the recipient.

For example, if you are giving the Wilder book to your niece, Jane, include a simple linear chart showing Jane's line of decent from Sally. Glue a pocket inside the cover of the book to hold the family chart, the census record and a

photograph of Sally's family with all of the members identified.

Be sure to use good quality or longlife paper and something other than ball point pen for your documentation.

By investing a little extra in good quality supplies, you will be leaving a gift for future generations as well.

Questions and queries from persons in search of Nebraska and Iowa ancestors will be selected for use in the column. Questions should be a general interest: to beginning researchers. Individual letters on extensive research problems cannot be answered. Queries should be in reference to a specific family and must give approximate dates and places of residence. MARRIAGE RECORDS...as written in Ancestry, Vol II #3, May-June 1984 reveals special problems in using marriage records. "An estimated thirty percent of the marraiage records in this country are incomplete. Many returns were never submitted to the civil authorities and countless others were lost. Marriage records throughout the United States often prove inaccurate. Some information was deliberately falsified by the bride and groom. To reduce their work loads, clerks often entered the date of the marriage at the time the license was issued instead of waiting for the return. Thus, marriage information should be compared with other facts known about the individual. Additional research may be necessary to resolve discrepancies. Spelling variants are also a problem. Many clerks did not ask couples how their names were spelled but made phonetic guesses instead.

If a marriage record is not on file for an ancestor, other records can be used to approximate the date. The 1900 Federal Census lists the number of years a couple has been married....newspapers have printed marriage announcements and engagements for decardes."

CAN YOU QUALIFY?

Two hereditary societies require long unbroken lines that lead from today back through a Revolutionary ancestor, then tracing further back into colonial times. These societies are (1) The Order of Founders and Patriots of America (1896)—hereinafter referred to as "Founders and Patriots"; and (2) The Daughters of Founders and Patriots of America (1898)—hereinafter referred to as "The Daughters."

Both societies require an unbroken paternal line of either the applicant's father or mother from an ancestor who settles in any of the colonies now included in the United States prior to a mid-1600's date. In the case of the Founders and Patriots, this date is 13 May 1657; for The Daughters, the date is from the settlement of Janestown, 13 May 1607, to 13 May 1687.

This means that only the surname of either of the applicant's parents can be used to qualify. However, a very recent change made by the Founders and Patriots permits the surname of the paternal grandparents to begin the unbroken line back into colonial history.

Both societies require that an intermediate ancestor must have served in some capacity during the Revolution. The Founders and Patriots require an ancestor who during the (1775-1783) adhered as patriot to the cause of the colonies, this meaning military or naval service against Great Britain, or affirmative public and constant acts showing adherence and loyalty to the American cause during this period. The Daughters require an intermediate ancestor who, by personal service in a civil or military capacity, or by other acts proving his unfailing loyalty, assisted in establishing American independence.

Each of these societies has objectives which stress patriotism, history of the colonies and the Republic, the discovery, collection, and preservation of family records, and commemoration and celebration of historic events. Why not check your lineage charts and recors? Perhaps you are among the few who can qualify for membership in one of these societies.


